efforts of Officer David San Juan to combat gang activity in the Little Havana area, and catch a glimpse of the life of Coach Isaac Williams, who dedicates his free time to mentoring our community's children. These individuals exemplify the spirit of commitment and service MPD values, and I hope you enjoy hearing their accounts as much as I did. 2016 was a successful year for MPD. We experienced approximately a 26% decrease in homicides and 14% reduction in robberies, respectively, in comparison to the previous year. This is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our personnel whose staffing levels are at a historic high. Despite a high level of personnel separating from service, the Recruitment and Selection Unit worked diligently to screen an extensive number of applicants and hired ahead of attrition. The Training Unit graduated 131 City of Miami police recruits in 2016. As future leaders of MPD, I encourage these new officers to face challenges head-on and remain steadfast in their duties. I expect them to uphold the pledge they took by exhibiting professionalism, integrity, and commitment to exceeding the community's expectations during each public encounter.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF



Honoring Every Resting Officer



The month of May is the national month of remembrance for the service and sacrifice of military and law enforcement personnel. Officers' dedication and commitment are honored throughout the nation with ceremonies and events such as National Police Week, held annually in Washington, D.C.



In May 2011, the Police Officer Assistance Trust (POAT) initiated Project HERO – Honoring Every Resting Officer in Miami-Dade County. POAT provided flags and grave markers in the shape of police badges to each agency who had lost officers in the line of duty. Five years later, Project HERO continues to recognize those who made the ultimate sacrifice by honoring them at their final resting place. In memoriam to fallen officers, United States and Eternal Blue Line flags are placed at the burial site of each officer. The flags fly for the entire month. Additionally, law enforcement agencies fly the Eternal Blue Line flag at half-mast.

MPD Project HERO members paid tribute to 38 fallen officers in 2016. A moment of silence is held as a gesture of respect at each location. "It is important for every officer to know the history of our fallen brothers. It is our duty to their families to show them that we will never forget their loved ones. As we pay our respects each May, we take time to reflect on each officer's life. Project HERO honors the officers who gave their lives to their community, to the City of Miami." – Sergeant Jerry Lynn Dellamico, MPD Project HERO Coordinator.





Vibrant, energetic, and passionate are three words used by his peers to describe him. For four years, Isaac Williams has volunteered his time to the children of Miami Police Athletic League (PAL)'s youth football program. At 23 years old, the volunteer coach who grew up in the Overtown community of Miami, is giving back by mentoring the youth in the area. One of 17 siblings, Coach Williams has had to deal with his share of hardships; since 2015, he has lost three brothers to gun violence. The things he has seen in the community have motivated him to assist those who need it most – the kids.

Coach Williams has a deep love for the children he coaches and mentors, providing guidance, encouragement, and lending assistance to them. To ensure success in the classroom, he is attentive to their grades and maintains positive relationships with their teachers. He has an obvious passion for what he does and is dedicated to his work. He sees his volunteer service as a process saying, "I look at it as planting seeds. It takes time to grow and to see change, but as long as you continue to water and nurture it, the plant will grow."

In addition to his work with Miami PAL, Coach Williams also lends his time to the Touching Miami with Love organization, where he volunteers as an instructional advocate. He holds an Associate in Arts degree in Pre-Law and an Associate in Science degree in Paralegal Studies from Miami-Dade College and works as a detention officer for the Broward Regional Juvenile Center. His ultimate goal is to open his own non-profit center to continue his work with the community.

In November of 2016, Coach Williams was selected as one of two grand-prize winners from 1,000 nominees nationwide to receive the Thanks Coach Award by USA Football. Thank you Coach Williams for being a vital part of Miami PAL and giving back to the community!

Detective David San Juan







The operation was initiated in October 2014, due to a rash of shootings that occurred between rival gang members in the Little Havana NET Area. Detective San Juan had numerous sources that informed him that the Third Street Gang was responsible for several shootings and homicides. This gang was also responsible for several other violent crimes and sales of narcotics in the Little Havana NET Area.

Operation Take Back Little Havana also led Detective San Juan to assist homicide detectives in the apprehension of two homicide offenders and the recovery of eight firearms, including one which had been stolen from a police vehicle. In addition, Detective San Juan made nine arrests leading to two federal indictments and disrupted this criminal gang's ability to operate and terrorize the citizens of Little Havana.


We recognize Detective San Juan's exceptional work on this case. Thanks for keeping our streets safe!

The Miami Police Department "Officer of the Year" was awarded to Detective David San Juan who was assigned to the Special Investigations Section's Criminal Gang Intelligence Detail. During the month of March 2016, Detective San Juan successfully concluded an investigation called Operation Take Back Little Havana. This operation yielded numerous arrests and effectively dismantled the Third Street Gang.









The Police Academy Class (PAC) consists of approximately 26 weeks of paramilitary structured training with various physical training requirements and performance goals. Fitness benchmarks such as calisthenics, cross fitness, and weight training exercises have been incorporated into the program. The most significant and historical accomplishment since the first PAC (PAC 83) was attained by Recruit Michael Aguilera (PAC 118). This recruit was the Top Gun, Top Academy Student, and Top Physical Fitness award winner for his class, the first triple category award winner for our Police Training College.

For the calendar year 2016:

A total of 11 classes graduated from the Miami Police College:

- 8 PAC classes for approximately 225 police recruits (PAC 111, 112, 113, 114, 115, 116, 117, 118)
- 2 Traffic Control Specialist Classes for a total of 20 TCS (Class 1 & 2)
- 1 Public Service Aide Class (PSA #6) 10 PSA recruits





On May 3, 2016, while patrolling the Upper Eastside neighborhood of Miami, Officer Ryan Michel noticed a woman and three children sitting at a bus stop. Later in his shift, he saw the family sleeping on the same bus bench. Officer Michel approached them to see if they were okay. During

the conversation, he discovered that the family was in desperate need of assistance. The family had traveled to Miami from Nassau, Bahamas because the youngest son (age 19 months) required two surgeries to correct a birth defect. The first surgery was still a week away.

Due to a series of unfortunate events, the \$3,500 the family had come to Miami with was lost and they were forced to leave the motel in which they were lodged. With no shelter or bed space available, Officer Michel gave the family the money in his wallet which was enough for food and a few nights at a motel. A few days later, Officer Michel checked on the family and paid for two more days at the motel. Worried that the family would be homeless for Mother's Day, Officer Michel reached out to Sergeant Eduardo Perez for assistance. Sergeant Perez started a fundraising campaign via a Go Fund Me webpage and donated the first \$100 to the cause. Local media broadcast the family's story and donations began to pour in; the family fund grew to over \$12,000 in just over a 48-hour period.



Over the next 30 days, Officer Michel and Sergeant Perez selflessly volunteered on their days off to help the family, coordinating with various motels in the area to assist the family with lodging. They drove the family to the grocery store and doctor appointments, often treating them to lunch. Due to the nature of the upcoming surgery, they were advised that moving the son from hotel to hotel could lead to a higher chance of post-operation infection. After receiving this news, Sergeant Perez began a diligent search for an apartment. Using funds raised, he was able to pre-pay for six months' rent and utilities on an apartment.

On June 2, 2016, Sergeant Perez and Officer Michel handed the family the keys to their new apartment. The officers obtained three new bicycles (one with a baby seat for the youngest family member), toys, and furnishings purchased with Go Fund Me donations. The family was also given over \$2,100 in cash and pre-paid credit cards for their necessities.

Sergeant Perez and Officer Michel exemplify the spirit of excellence through service. For this, they were awarded MPD's Officer of the Month award in June 2016 and honored by the Rotary Club of Miami receiving the Officer of the Year Award. They went above and beyond the call of duty to ensure that this family's needs were not only met, but surpassed. We are proud of their exceptional work and invaluable efforts.



The Traffic Control Specialist classes are designed to provide recruits the training required to effectively control traffic in the most congested areas in our city. They also respond to unexpected needs and requests for traffic control in school areas, special events, and some construction areas. This class is the first of its kind in Miami






On Tuesday, November 1, 2016, veteran City of Miami Police Officer Jorge Sanchez was killed in a tragic vehicle crash while travelling to his regular assignment as a Motor Officer in the Traffic Enforcement Unit. Officer Sanchez was born in the Vedado neighborhood of Havana, Cuba in 1963. His father, Carlos Vicente Sanchez, was a political prisoner under the oppressive Castro regime and was ultimately granted political asylum in the United States in 1979. Like so many other Cuban natives in exile, Carlos Sanchez relocated his family to Miami, where 16-year-old Jorge attended Miami Senior High.

In 1995, Jorge Sanchez was sworn in as a Miami Police Officer. Over the course of his 21-year career he held assignments in several specialized units, including Gangs, Missing Persons, and Juvenile Investigations. His great passion, however, was for the Motor Detail. Jorge Sanchez was the quintessential motor officer; an exceptionally tall man, he projected strength, confidence, and professionalism in every traffic stop, event motorcade, and presidential escort detail he conducted. He is survived by his fiancée Evelyn, his daughter Elizabeth, his son Jorge Jr., and his eldest son Eric, who in 2014 followed in his father's footsteps to become a City of Miami Police Officer.

In honor of his ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty, Jorge Sanchez was posthumously promoted to the rank of Major. Major Jorge Sanchez's Miami Police Department family misses him dearly, and will forever cherish his memory.


