

After 28 years of service, I was privileged to be appointed Chief of Police on January 26, 2018. The 2017 MPD Annual Report is a year-in-review which tells a small account of the larger scope of events performed throughout the year. MPD's sworn and civilian personnel participated in many events, assisting community members and providing services to our citizens. 



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Axon Body Camera Industry Day

On Thursday, January 19, 2017, the City of Miami Police Department participated in a Body Worn Camera (BWC) Industry Day. This event was attended by city procurement personnel, grant writers, IT personnel, police staff, CIP civilian guests, and the Virtual Policing Unit. Seventeen (17) vendors were invited to attend this event. Each vendor was allotted twenty (20) minutes to demonstrate and speak about their body worn camera capabilities, limitations, software, and storage solutions. There were several BWC's that police and civilian personnel liked best because of their ease of use, capabilities, and innovative design.

During our interaction with civilians, (i.e., CIP) the main concern was that video captured by a device could be tampered with prior to an upload of the video. According to the vendors, in order to ensure video integrity, the BWC storage is securely enclosed and encrypted for a tamper-resistant video that could only be uploaded through the vendor's dock and secured software. A lost BWC's video could not be accessed without administrative permissions and secured encryptions.

Our IT personnel debated whether the best fit for the department was cloud or local server storage. Additionally, the cost benefit to our department was analyzed.

The Virtual Policing Unit was impressed with new, currently available BWC technology. Some of the features that several vendors provide are automatic activation of BWC when a firearm or taser is withdrawn from a holster trigger.

Several vendors have BWC's that provide the ability to integrate with our radio system and stream live video with GPS technology for officer safety purposes. Some vendors provide mobile applications and the ability to input case numbers, categorize events, write notes, and take photos. These features are time saving and allow officers to input information quickly and efficiently.

Due to the successful event, the Miami Police Department was able to make an informed decision on which vest would be suitable for the department.



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Black History Celebration

The Community Relations Section, in conjunction with the Field Operation Division, spearheaded its first Black History Street Festival Celebration right on the streets of Northwest 2nd Avenue and 4th Street in front of the Miami Police Department main headquarters. The celebration, held on February 24, 2017, was a collaboration of local vendors selling food, clothing, perfume, and sweet treats. Also available for sale was Black History Art. Bahamian Junkanoo Dancers entertained the crowd, and DJ Ben Hop delighted with musical tunes. The event was attended by community residents, local business owners, city and state employees. The celebration was a major success. It was exciting, educational, and fun for everyone!



Ultra Music Festival

The Ultra Music Festival was founded by Miami native, Russell Faibisch, who produced the first event in 1999 on Miami Beach. For the past 18 years, the music festival has been held in Downtown Miami.

On March 24 – 26, 2017, Bayfront Park was host to 165,000 attendees from around the world. With a lineup of world-class notable artists and DJ's, electronic dance music fans delighted in the pulsating music that emanated from across eight stages. Visually, the crowd was treated to lasers, lights, and pyrotechnics throughout the event. Millions of viewers worldwide were also able to experience the entertainment via live stream broadcast.

Ultra was voted the best music festival in the world by DJ magazine. Outside of Miami, Ultra Worldwide, is known for its events in Argentina, Bali, Croatia, Korea, Peru, South Africa, and Thailand, just to name a few countries.



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Citizens Police Academy

The Miami Police Department's Citizens Police Academy provides residents and City business owners with a broad overview of the curriculum that police recruits learn during several months of intense training. For participants, the Citizens Police Academy is a thorough look at how each topic (police budget, traffic enforcement, criminal investigations, to name a few) relates to and affects our very own community. The Citizens Police Academy is open to any City of Miami resident or business owner over the age of 18. Consent for a background check is required prior to program admission. The Academy meets one full day per week for two weeks at the Miami Police College. At the conclusion of the program, each participant receives a certificate of achievement.



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Blood DriveCommunity Service Award

Officer Kenia Fallat, who is assigned to the Public Information Office was awarded for the Community Service Award in May 2017.

On May 9, 2017, Officer Fallat coordinated a blood drive to assist Miami-Dade County Police Major Ricky Carter and Miami Police Officer Carlos Gomez. During separate incidents, Major Carter and Officer Gomez suffered life-sustaining injuries during traffic crashes, leaving them in critical condition and in need of emergency blood. She made the necessary arrangements to ensure the blood drive would be open to the public as well as inhouse police personnel. Officer Fallat initially made accommodations for four One Blood buses to set up outside the Miami Police Department's Central Headquarters and strategically had a contingency plan to be housed inside the Miami Police College in the event Miami Police on-duty personnel wanted to donate blood, so that it could be done in an expeditious manner.

Initially, the plan was for the drive to take place from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Due to an outpour of the community's response, she sought the opportunity and extended the blood drive until 9 p.m. The participation for the blood drive was a success and at its conclusion, one hundred persons donated blood.

We truly commend Officer Fallat for her dedication and kind heart.



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PAC #121 Spotlight

The Police Academy Class (PAC) consists of approximately 29 weeks of paramilitary structured training with various physical training requirements and performance goals. PAC #121 started on November 7, 2016, with a total of 22 recruits from various walks of life. The class graduated on June 2, 2017, with 100% passing the State Exam. Wadney Toussaint obtained the highest GPA in the class with a 98.3%. Among the class were officers Alain Etienne and Anthony Montes, who serve in the United States Armed Forces, Army and Marine Corps., respectively.

Fitness benchmarks such as calisthenics, cross fitness, and weight training exercises have been incorporated into the program. Below are the results of the top male and female of PAC #121:

- Mercedes Gonzalez was given the Top Gun Award; she performed exceptionally well in the handgun course, obtaining a score of 45 out of 48 on her first attempt, and 45 out of 48 on her second attempt. With the shot gun course, this recruit scored 71 out of 72. During night shooting, this individual obtained 36 out of 36.
- Natasha Adley was placed on the Best of the Best Wall in the academy for having the all-time fastest time for females in the 300-meter run with 48.60 seconds breaking an all time record. PAC #121 also completed a few community projects. On January 10, 2017, they helped feed the elderly; the class helped feed and clothe the homeless in Loomis Park on January 17, 2017. On March 9, the class completed a beautification of the central station parking lot area as they painted the sidewalks, poles, parking spots, and made parking spots for the motor units.



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All Star Game Major League Baseball

Major League Baseball (MLB) brought their talent to Miami from July 6-11, 2017 for the 88th Annual MLB All-Star Game. Leading up to the big game, various activities were held throughout the week for baseball fans of all ages. A 5K run taking participants through downtown Miami, a large scale Zumba session at Bayfront Park, a celebrity softball game, and the popular Home Run Derby were some events that took place during the week. With an attendance level above 37,000 people, MPD personnel played an integral part in planning with the MLB organization and outside agencies to ensure the safety of the public, monitoring the venues and surrounding areas, and deploying additional resources as needed. 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HURRICANE

The Office of Emergency Management and Homeland Security (OEMHS) was established in the late 1990's as an essential function for the City of Miami Police Department. The primary mission was to advise of any aspect of critical incident management, maintain departmental contingency plans, provide support during mobilizations, community outreach, and training. A critical aspect of incident management is hurricane and/or disaster preparedness. During times of fair weather, the unit is responsible for training, reviewing policies and procedures, and determining resilience for critical infrastructure.

During the month of September 2017, South Florida was besieged by Hurricane Irma and other severe weather patterns affecting the entire region. As several hurricanes formed and traversed the Atlantic, officers at the Miami Police Department faced challenges with their personal lives as well as their required duties to the citizens of Miami. The OEMHS was tasked with monitoring all storm updates from the National Hurricane Center. This included twice daily conference calls to receive storm forecasts directly from meteorologists. Additionally, the unit ensured that the Police Command Center was fully operational and all technical equipment used therein was functioning and ready for a complex incident response. These systems included the Communications dispatch terminals, additional 911 call taker terminals in the Police Command Center, and the Hurrevac (Real Time Hurricane Tracking System).

The OEMHS was also responsible for ensuring preparedness by providing supplies of food and water for alternative conditions, generators for offsite locations, and manning the Emergency Operations Center (the center point for command staff decision making and accountability). At the time of Hurricane Irma, members of the OEMHS Team focused on allocating additional supplies for officers working in the community after sustained extensive damage of the area. In further support of the citizens of South Florida, officers delivered life sustaining supplies to neighboring jurisdictions such as the City of Key West. The Miami Police Department exemplified an extraordinary display of teamwork and dedication to the community during a time of crisis.



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Domestic Violence Awareness Month

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The Victim Advocate Services Unit (VAS) recognized the importance of the education and outreach to victims of domestic violence and the growing role of law enforcement agencies in performing this function. While law enforcement has always been engaged in the criminal investigation of these crimes, the social impact frequently gets lost in the process. The VAS has made a conscious effort to change this narrative. They strive to overcome the stigma of domestic violence and to reach out to victims to make them understand that they are not alone. Beyond outreach, the education of victims is just as vital. Legal, financial, and social education is the only proven method to prevent reoccurrence of domestic violence and to help victims escape the cycle of abuse. During the month of October, the Victim Advocate Services Unit worked tirelessly to provide outreach and education services to the victims of domestic violence.

On October 2, 2017, the Unit organized and lead the Domestic Violence Awareness Walk in conjunction with the Miami-Dade State Attorney's Office and other neighborhood partners. The walk, which encompassed the downtown civic buildings, was attended by hundreds of advocates, victims, and industry professionals. By openly acknowledging the victims of domestic violence and bringing public awareness to the plight, the walk served to lower the stigma of victimization and educate those who may not be aware of the pervasiveness of the issue.

On October 25, 2017, the VAS conducted an educational seminar on Financial Empowerment for Victims of Domestic Violence. This seminar provided education and services to victims of domestic violence and the various agencies that serve them. The number one reason victims stay in abusive relationships is that they do not have the ability to break free. By providing education on how to use, acquire, and maintain financial resources, the cycle of violence can be severed. This seminar, the first to be held in the City of Miami, provided education to scores of victims and providers at no charge.



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911 Donates Thanksgiving Baskets

Thanksgiving is a time we recommit our energies to being generous and giving thanks. The emphasis is not on giving or buying, but on being thankful and expressing appreciation to one another. On November 21, 2017, the Miami Police Communications Unit exemplified what it is to be a blessing to others by providing groceries and gift cards to four families in need.

The donations were collected from dispatchers, call takers, and supervisors of the unit. Employees went grocery shopping and purchased items for the families to feed their loved ones on Thanksgiving Day. The remaining monies were divided and gift cards given to each of the families.

The first family to receive this blessing was a single mother with five children. She was very grateful in receiving the food that was given to her and began hugging each of the dispatchers as they brought the bags of food inside the house. The second family was a married couple down on their luck. The husband had cancer and had lost his job as the wife struggled to provide for the family, eventually losing her job as well. The third family was a single mother of three children, including one who was pregnant. Lastly, was a single elderly woman who resided alone. The expressions on their faces was priceless as they received these blessings.



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
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Christmas Door Decorating Contest






