Message From The Chief

Welcome to the 2018 Miami Police Department (MPD) Annual Report. My first year as Chief of Police was filled with challenges as well as opportunities. I was able to witness the hard work and commitment of MPD personnel exhibited in their daily duties and am proud to lead and work alongside such a phenomenal team of dedicated employees. As for opportunities, the Department was able to continue various partnerships with other agencies to accomplish goals such as mutual aid assistance and provide quality services to the community.

This year, the Department reports an 11% decrease in homicides and a 17% decrease in total robberies from 2017. These numbers are significant because they are evidence to me that proper communication and maintaining an open dialogue with the community are valid transformative efforts important in keeping crime levels down.

We continue to provide excellent service to the public, participating in various events such as National Night Out, Farm Shares, and Thanksgiving Turkey giveaways. We continue to host "Coffee with a Cop" events, where citizens can actively engage with NET Commanders and officers to discuss concerns. In addition to these community events, I hosted town hall meetings in each of our twelve NET areas. These gatherings have proved fruitful, providing opportunities for individuals to freely express ideas and brainstorm potential solutions with law enforcement concerning their respective neighborhoods.

MPD's Virtual Policing Unit continued its passage into the technological forefront with various updates. I am pleased to announce that the number of street cameras increased to 145, up from only 17 in 2017. These cameras, in conjunction with the Shotspotter program, function as crime deterrents and assist investigative units. In today's world, cameras are a vital part of maintaining safe neighborhoods. In addition to street cameras, the number of body cameras deployed by our patrol officers has reached a total of 1,326. These devices all serve to protect officers as well as the public during any encounters.

Along the lines of providing safety to our communities, the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs awarded \$1.6 million to fund efforts to address the opioid epidemic in the City of Miami. This funding allows for the implementation of a Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Site-based Program to establish pre-arrest diversion services for persons with behavioral and substance abuse challenges. The outpatient treatment program will provide social and mental health services to those found with opioids. The program will be worked in conjunction with the Behavioral Science Research Institute. I hope to see positive results exhibited in the community with less deaths due to the opioid crisis that has recently plagued the nation.

This report serves as a snapshot of 2018 events and activities the MPD team participated in throughout the year. I am pleased of our accomplishments and look forward to continued service to the community in 2019.

January

Three Kings Day Parade

On Sunday, January 14, Univision Miami presented the 48th annual “Desfile de los Tres Reyes Magos” (Three Kings Day Parade) which took place in the streets of Little Havana. Each year thousands of South Floridians hit the streets of Little Havana for the annual parade which is held to honor the Hispanic tradition of the day when the three wise men arrived to worship and bring three gifts to the baby Jesus after following a star in the heavens, according to the Gospel of Matthew.

The 2018 Three Kings Day Parade was attended by approximately 15,000 people and featured entertainment and surprises for all ages. Admission was free and local vendors and restaurants sold food, drinks and other trinkets.

Award-winning singer, songwriter, musician and producer Luis Fonsi was honored as Grand Marshal of the event. His recent hit “Despacito” topped music charts across genres in the U.S. and abroad, making Fonsi one of the leading Latin music figures of his generation. Fonsi shared the spotlight with young patients of St. Jude Children’s Research Hospital, an organization he has supported for many years as spokesperson, helping raise awareness about St. Jude’s mission.

Special guests included “Primer Impacto’s” Pamela Silva Conde, Tony Dandrades and Borja Voces and “Noticiero Univision Edición Digital’s” Carolina Sarassa and Javier Olivares. The parade featured popular Univision Miami radio and television personalities, including “Noticias 23’s” anchors Alina Mayo Azze, and Ambrosio Hernandez, as well as Javier Romero, Alberto Sardiñas, Danny Cruz, Santi y Laurita, Los Pichy Boys, Ninoska Perez Castellon, Martha Flores and Jose Alfonso Almora.

February

Take Your Child to Work Day



On February 6, 2018, we celebrated take your child to work day. Most of the activities were at the Miami Riverside Center; however, the Community Relations Section set up a table within the Central District Lobby. Popcorn was provided for all the visitors and young adults who were visiting with their parents. PAL mascot Buddy Blue handed out ice slushies in the lobby.

The Community Relations Section conducted several presentations at the Juvenile Service Department. One of the presentations was on Drug Awareness. Participants were encouraged to discuss drug awareness and how to not take part in drug related activities. Another topic which was presented was safety/police encounters. It was an awesome experience for both the children and the Community Relations Section.

The kids were provided a tour of the station where they learned about different units of the police department such as Crime Scene Investigations, Motors, and Bomb Squad.





The Public Information Office (PIO) spearheaded a multi-layered marketing campaign to promote a “No Questions Asked” gun buyback scheduled for Saturday, March 18, 2018, at Henderson Park in the Little Havana NET area. The campaign included press releases, flyers, and a steady stream of radio and television interviews in both English and Spanish. In addition, PIO staffers cultivated partnerships with local businesses and community stakeholders, such as Milam Market, Event Star, Mobile Mike Media Marketing Services and the Auto Firm, to secure gift cards and other items to serve as an incentive for interested parties to relinquish any unwanted firearms at the event.

Meanwhile, the Social Media Unit produced a promotional video for Twitter and other platforms that underscored the objective of the department’s ongoing gun buyback initiative, which was to give citizens a safe opportunity to relinquish any unwanted firearms that may be in their possession, thus taking the weapons out of the community and, potentially, out of the hands of criminals. A total of 130 handguns were collected. Persons turning in their firearms each received a gift card, ranging in value from \$50-\$250.

Do The Right Thing



Each month, the Do The Right Thing Program (DTRT) recognizes and rewards young people in our community who choose to do the right thing. From saving a life and other heroic acts to overcoming adversity or outstanding community service, DTRT's mission is to foster positive relationships between police officers and students. Out of 800 nominations received, 10 students are selected as top winners to attend a monthly awards ceremony at Miami Police headquarters. Each receives a host of prizes including mini-tablets, plaques, t-shirts, and other items donated by local businesses.

The Do The Right Thing Program created the Officer Do Right initiative in elementary/K8 schools that are located in At-Risk zip codes to provide positive, one-on-one interaction with police officers. Several officers from the Miami Police Department enjoyed monthly visits to their respective schools to deliver prize incentives to up to 15 DTRT student nominees. In addition to awarding prizes for doing the right thing, Officer Do Rights bring in Happy Meal lunches donated by local, participating McDonald's franchise owners so DTRT nominees can "Dine with Officer Do Right." Our Officer Do Rights are also on the lookout for students doing the right thing during their visits and invite them to spin the Do The Right Thing prize wheel for special rewards such as McDonald's Happy Meal Be Our Guest cards, bike safety lights, and pencils.

May

Health Fair 2018

The City of Miami Risk Management Department's Group Benefits Division is committed to ensuring that all City of Miami employees have opportunities to learn about health and wellness. With that goal in mind, the department focused on branding its wellness strategy, Stay Active Miami (SAM). Each year, the Risk Management Department and its Health Plan Administrator CIGNA fund, plan and host a variety of events including the Mercedes-Benz Corporate Run, the Susan G Komen 5K Walk/Run, and Employee Health Fairs.

MPD's Annual Employee Health Fair was held on Wednesday, May 16, in MPD's Headquarters' main lobby. The fair was open for all MPD personnel, both sworn and civilian. Through a collaborative approach with the Cigna onsite team and the City's Benefits Consultants USI, vendors were selected to bring educational resources including free skin cancer screenings, financial information regarding retirement and savings, vision and optical plan information, health plan information, and free onsite biometric screenings.

Farm Share



On June 22, 2018, the Community Relations Section and Overtown NET Commander William R. July

One Bullet Kills the Party



On July 3, 2018, the City of Miami Police Department joined city and county officials for the annual “One Bullet Kills the Party” news conference held at Henry Reeves Park. These officials came together to urge residents to refrain from celebratory gunfire during the July 4th holiday and to implore the community to cease gun violence. During the press conference, law enforcement officials reinforced the following message: “Discharging a firearm into the air without regard for the safety of others will land you in jail.”

The event was organized by Miami-Dade County Commissioner Audrey M. Edmonson in partnership with City of Miami Mayor Francis Suárez. Featured speakers included Miami Police Chief Jorge Colina and Miami-Dade Police Director Juan Perez. “I can assure you this: If we come across someone who’s firing a gun into the air on Fourth of July, there’s no exception to the rule,” Chief Colina said. “You will be arrested.”

“Once you shoot a bullet in the air, it will eventually come down, and it could come down on one of these precious young people,” said Mayor Suárez.

“For those individuals that are out in the communities thinking about shooting,” Miami-Dade Police Director Juan Perez stated. “Think about the harm that you will do, the chaos that you will cause in the life of these kids.”



August

National Night Out



On Tuesday, August 7, 2018, the City of Miami Police Department hosted their 35th Annual National Night Out. Usually the City hosts one event. This year, in efforts to increase attendance, the event was launched in each of the three districts; the Liberty Square area of the North District, Roberto Clemente Park in the Central District, and Shenandoah Park in the South District.

The North District chose to showcase the theme “Who are the People in my Neighborhood” to embrace unity and strengthen relationships between police and citizens. The free event took place from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. and attendees were treated to food, music, games, and live entertainment. Various on-site vendors provided services to the community including AIDS/HIV testing, State Attorney’s Office expungements, Department of Motor Vehicle services, and voter registration, to name a few. Members of MPD’s Recruitment and Selection Unit performed recruitment efforts and SWAT officers displayed the inside of the SWAT vehicle.





September Chief's Gala

On September 15, 2018, the 2018 Police Chief's Gala to benefit the Miami Police Athletic League (PAL) was held at the JW Marriott Marquis Hotel in downtown Miami. The theme, "Celebrating Today's Youth, Aiming for a Stellar Future" celebrated the future of technological advances in science. Guests attended a cocktail reception, dinner, participated in auctions, and enjoyed live entertainment. The gala was filled with special guests to include Emilio and Gloria Estefan, Brazilian automobile racing driver Emerson Fittipaldi, and iHeart radio personality Enrique Santos. With over 500 guests in attendance, the successful sold-out event raised over \$200,000.00.

Proceeds from the gala will benefit the Miami PAL Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) program. The mentoring program will expand educational opportunities to children aged 5 – 18 within the Miami PAL and allow the prioritization of hands-on learning to increase student engagement.

October

Hispanic Heritage

During National Hispanic Heritage Month (September 15 to October 15) we celebrate and recognize the contributions made by Hispanic and Latino Americans to the United States. Hispanic Heritage Month is an official celebration of American citizens whose ancestry can be traced back to Spain, Mexico, Central America, South America and the Caribbean.

This year, the City of Miami Police Department spearheaded two events which showcased the culture and diversity of the Hispanic and Latino heritage in the community. In observance of Hispanic Heritage, the Community Relations Section organized multiple events in the Central and South Districts.

On October 12, 2018, the Central District celebrated "El Día de la Raza." This day paid tribute to the positive influence Hispanic Heritage has in our country through their strong commitment to family, faith, hard work, and service. There were approximately 500 people in attendance from both the police department and the public. The attendees enjoyed crafts, artwork, food, music, and dance that was a representation of various Hispanic cultures.

The South District held their celebration on October 19, 2018 at Domino Park. One thousand (1,000) people participated in the event which showcased the diversity as well as similarities of Hispanic communities through arts and dance.

During this Thanksgiving holiday, the Community Relations Unit came up with a simple yet creative way to appreciate the communities we serve. In the spirit of the holiday, a “Turkey Giveaway” was arranged by CPS Barbara Sweet for the Upper Eastside and Little Haiti NET areas. Through the generosity of anonymous donations, CPS Sweet and CPS Rosa Fernander purchased 25 turkeys for the occasion.

On November 13th and 20th, Commanders Antonio Regueira and Fabria Ellington, along with their teams, took to the streets stopping vehicles for traffic infractions. However, instead of issuing tickets, they gave each driver a turkey for the holidays! Each resident was pleasantly surprised and grateful to receive a turkey and expressed their gratitude to each commander and those responsible for their thoughtfulness.





December

Holiday Lunch/Dinner Celebration

The Miami Police holiday lunch/dinner was started by a police captain in the South District Station parking lot in December 1998 as gratitude to the south district officers. Two pigs were roasted in caja china in the rear parking lot area and side dishes were served. The following year, two officers coordinated the event. They prepared fried turkeys in deep fryers and side dishes were cooked and brought from home. In 2001, the lunch/dinner was expanded to cover all shifts city wide and include all Miami Police sworn and civilian personnel. The lunch/dinner grew so much that in 2008 it was moved from the South District Station to the Police Benevolent Association (PBA) grounds.

Over the years, many officers have retired but they make their way to the PBA to volunteer their time to cook and enjoy a hearty meal with friends. The lunch/dinner, in its 20th year, is a success due to the efforts of the men and women who work together to show appreciation to their police family. This event would not be possible without the assistance and coordination of the chief of police, his staff, the PBA, the Fraternal Order of Police, retirees, and Miami Police sworn and civilian volunteers.

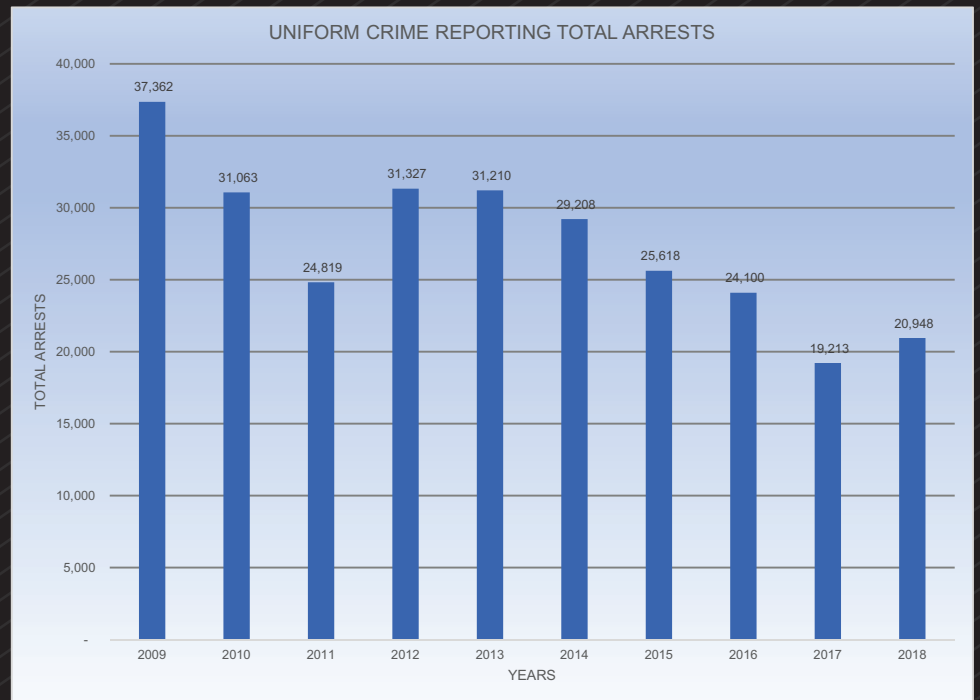
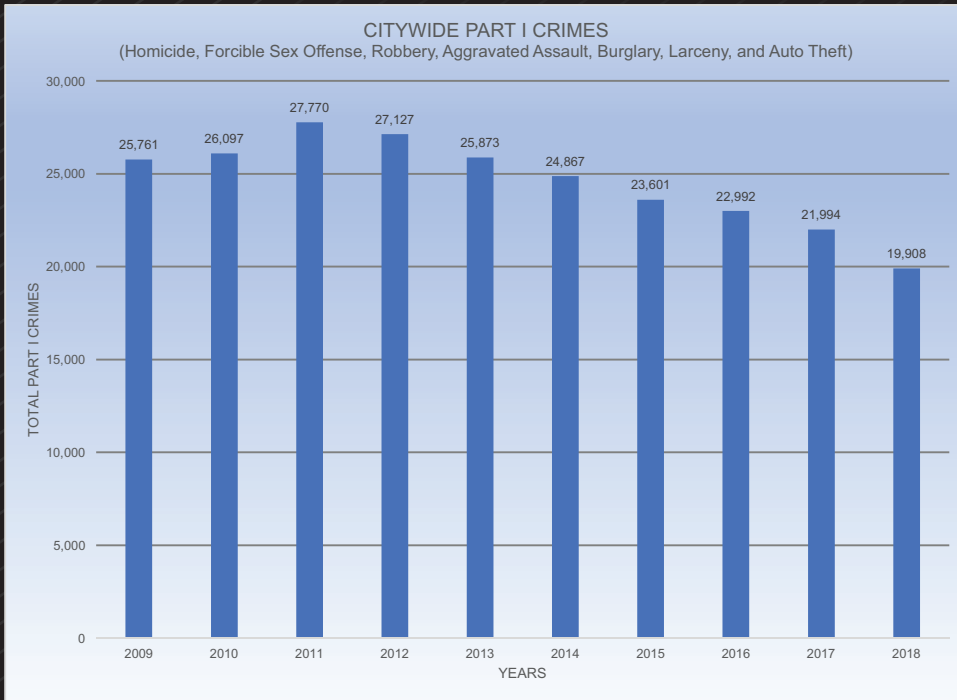

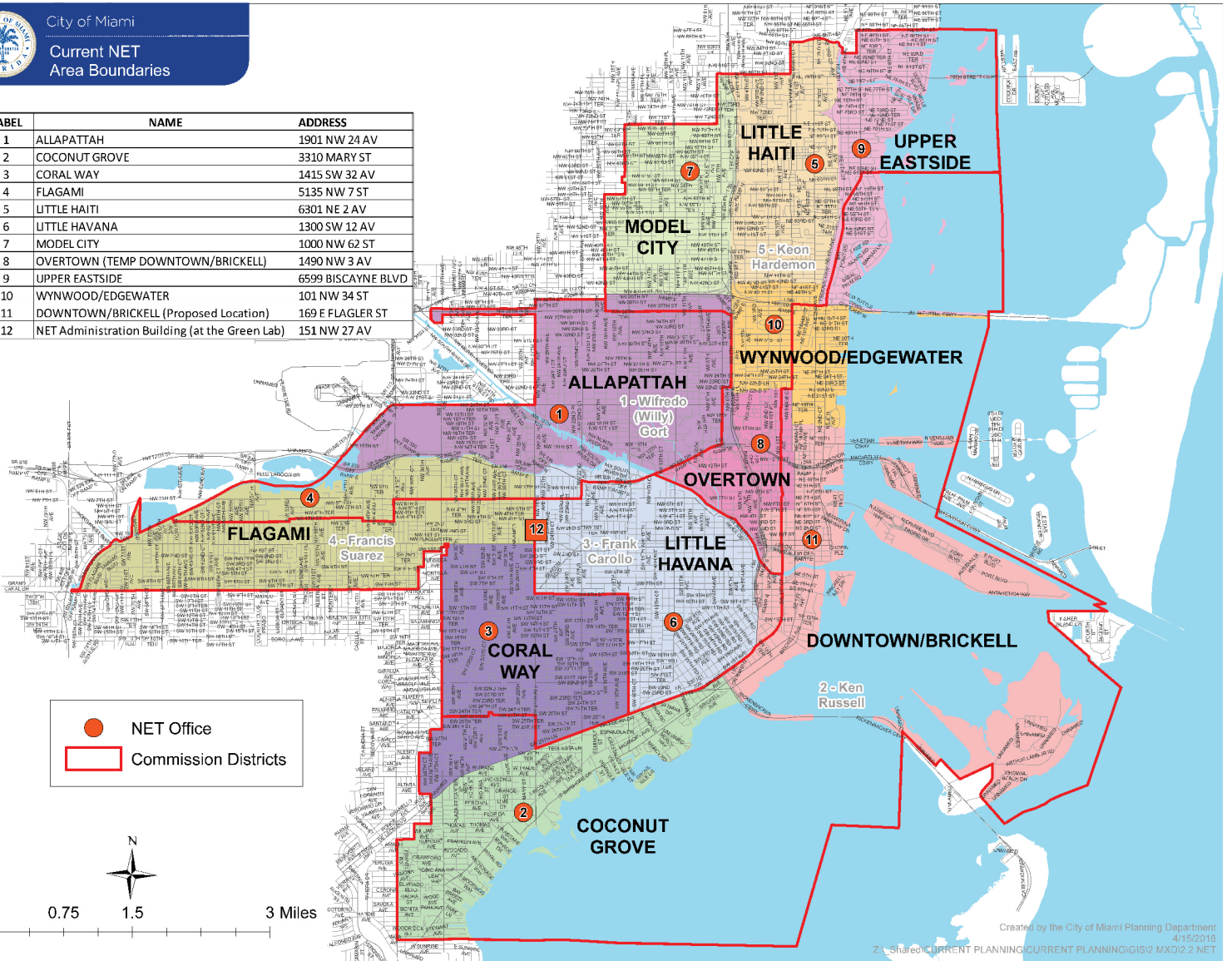
